Love Languages

I wonder if you are familiar with the theory of 'love languages?

It is a concept based on research by Dr Gary Chapman, a marriage counsellor and public speaker. Despite the original focus being couples/partners, elements of the theory can be applied to any form of relationship.

Basically, Chapman explains that there are five different love languages and each of us will have dominant language(s) through which we feel most loved or cared for. As an extension of this, there will be other 'languages' which, whilst such gestures are nice, they don't mean as much.

The languages are:

Words of Affirmation: communicating affection through spoken and written praise, appreciation and encouragement.

Quality Time: expressing love/care through shared activities, conversation, and togetherness.

Physical Touch: showing care through physical contact, including hugs, etc.

Acts of Service: doing thoughtful deeds and gestures to help the other person.

Receiving Gifts: giving meaningful surprises and thoughtful presents to celebrate affection/friendship.

Having conversations about what love language we and others have can be a really helpful activity. It helps you know each other better and affirms friendship by 'letting in' the other person.

It can also be a great way of avoiding disappointment...(!)

If ever you have put time and effort into a gesture and it hasn't led to quite the reaction you were hoping for, well, this could be the reason!

You gave them a hug, they wanted the whatever fixed.

You bought a gift, they just wanted time together.

And so on....

There are all sorts of resources online, including simple quizzes where you can find out your love language (if you're currently unsure). Why not give it a go and share the quiz link with family or friends. You could then chat about it and, in doing so, learn a bit more about yourselves and each other.

Country Notes for April 2024

April is the first full month of spring, and this is the month when there can usually be no doubt that winter is behind us and spring is really underway. Hopefully the rains of the last few months, which have left our fields and gardens waterlogged and which have taken a certain amount of pleasure out of walking, are now behind us.

This really is a month of change. Some trees and bushes will be beginning to show signs of green growth, elder being one of the early examples. In our lanes, fields and hedgerows primroses will continue to flower and will be joined by coltsfoot, which looks very similar to a thickly stemmed and rather short dandelion. Tiny blue violets will also be in flower, joined towards the end of the month by starry white wood anemones. More and more bluebells will also be appearing, ready for their full display in early May.

At the beginning of the month some of our wintering migrant birds, such as fieldfares and redwings, will still be around, but there will also be the first summer migrants arriving, often beginning with the first chiffchaffs and swallows. In fact, this year I heard my first chiffchaff in my garden at the beginning of the second week of March! It is also wonderful to see so many of our resident and migratory birds flying into trees and bushes with beaks full of nesting material, knowing that they will soon be laying eggs and rearing their nestlings.

There will also be the first sightings of our early butterflies, such as red admirals, small tortoiseshells, peacocks, brimstones and orange tips. Despite the generally very wet weather I saw my first yellow brimstone in my garden in the second week of March, on one of the few sunny days!

Perhaps you will be joining the Easter Trail organised by Hollingbourne Station in the first weekend of April. There will be lots to look out for if you do to add to the delight of all that chocolate!



Local elections are being held on **Thursday**, **2**nd **May**. Changes introduced last year now require anyone voting in person to bring acceptable **photographic ID**. This includes British passports and driving licences, even if they have expired as long as the photo is recognisable. Anyone without photographic ID can apply for a **Voter Authority Certificate** free of charge at wwww.gov.uk. This will require a National Insurance number and an upload of a clear image of the applicant's signature. 



Don't hesitate to use hearing aids

Here is something you didn't expect: using hearing aids if you are a bit deaf can be of great benefit to your overall health.

Crystal Rolfe, director of health at the Royal National Institute for Deaf People (RNID) said: "Hearing aids bring enormous benefits for people with hearing loss. Research shows that wearing hearing aids may reduce the risk of cognitive decline, and it is well known that they have positive effects on physical, social, emotional, and mental wellbeing.

According to hearing loss charity RNID, 12 million adults in the UK are deaf, have hearing loss or tinnitus and an estimated seven million people could benefit from hearing aids, but only about two million use them.

The researchers hope the findings, published in The Lancet Healthy Longevity journal, will encourage more people to wear hearing aids. As one doctor said: "If you have hearing loss, get hearing aids. The benefits could be limitless."

An update from your local MP Helen Whately

Where would we be without businesses? They grow our food, harness ideas that make our lives better, and generate the tax that pays for our public services – and that's just the start.

It's good news therefore that we now have over 5.6 million businesses across the country, an increase of nearly a quarter since 2010. Better still, we're lucky to have a thriving mix here in Faversham and Mid Kent.

From farms to foundries, health-tech to rocket manufacturers – we've got all kinds

In fact, one of the only things they all have in common is how tough they've found the last few years. Covid and then the global fuel shock have given businesses plenty to think about besides expanding.

With unprecedented support we got business through the pandemic, and, over the last year, we've worked hard to halve inflation. If we want to keep funding our public services, it's now time to get businesses thinking about growing again.

When I was a minister in the Treasury, I spent a huge amount of time looking at what we can do to help small businesses grow. Taking that next step can be a challenge, and we have to support businesses by getting policy right.

That's why at last month's Budget the Chancellor introduced a host of new measures to support them, including raising the VAT threshold, freezing alcohol duty to support pubs, and cutting tax for the self-employed. These measures are on top of the £11billion investment incentive introduced back in the Autumn - the biggest business tax cut in modern British history.

But it's not just at a national level that we need to get things right. There are so many things we can do at a local level to help too, and I've made it one of my 5 priorities to help our local businesses grow - with support from councils and government ministers.

Just after the Budget I sent a survey out to all of Faversham's businesses asking them what more we could be doing to support them – like making sure the town's parking policy works for them.

I invited the Farming Minister down to Graveney last year to listen to local growers' concerns, and have been sticking up for Stockbury's businesses as they deal with ongoing roadworks.

And last month I hosted the Maidstone Apprenticeship Fair where local businesses, like MEP Ltd from Aylesford and Bedfont Scientific from Harrietsham, could seek out the next generation of skills.

Local businesses make where we live richer in more ways than one, and the

more support we can give them the better. Please do think about backing local businesses when you can, and, if you run a local business and you need my help, please do get in touch . I'm here to help however I can.

Together we can boost our local economy and generate all kinds of new jobs.

Strict bedtimes could make children's brains 'bigger and healthier'

A family routine and a strict bedtime could help your child develop a healthier, bigger brain.

On the other hand, a disruptive family life with poor sleep patterns could mean your child has slower brain development, poorer cognitive function, and below average academic achievement.

Those are the findings of a new study from Colorado State University. It found that children thrive when the family has a weekly 'family time' together, when homework is done at the same time every day, the family eats dinner together every night, the child is expected to carry out regular household chores, and when bedtime is at a consistent time, accompanied by a bedtime story or similar calming ritual.

The underlying need is for the child to get enough regular and deep sleep. Children with disrupted families get disrupted sleep, and therefore are more likely to have thinner regions of the brain in the amygdala as well as parts of the left and right frontal cortex. These areas control skills related to language, behaviour, sensory perception, and emotional processing.

Residents being encouraged to apply for HUG2 funding

MBC is encouraging as many eligible residents as possible to apply for energy efficiency and heating upgrades via the Home Upgrade Grant – Phase 2 (HUG2).

Households struggling with rising energy bills and vulnerable residents facing impossible choices to try and keep warm may worry during the colder months and the government led grant could help them.

Open for applications until the end of 2024, HUG2 helps fund energy efficiency upgrades and low carbon heating systems, targeting some of the most inefficiently heated homes (i.e. an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) between D and G) and which are not heated by mains gas heating systems.

Homeowners and private tenants on low incomes can check whether their household is eligible via **maidstone.gov.uk** search: **HUG2 Application**.

The home must be heated by alternative fuels including electricity, oil, liquid propane gas, and solid fuels. The energy efficiency criteria will be determined by the Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating of the property.

Once someone has applied, they will be guided by local installers to help them understand and establish eligibility for the scheme. If eligible, the installer will identify which improvements for the home will pred the greatest benefits and arrange any necessary surveys and installations.

HUG2 is a government initiative being led by the Department for Energy, Security and Net Zero. The scheme allows funding per property to provide a range of energy and cost saving upgrades, depending on the specific circumstances such as the fuel source, energy efficiency and EPC rating of the home, with the most funding available for the least efficient homes heated by the most polluting fuel sources.

LEEDS CASTLE

Spring has arrived on the estate, with increasingly warm and sunny days, which is hugely welcome after the long, rainy winter period. The daffodils are out, as are lots of beautiful purple crocus. The hellebores are out in the borders and soon, spring flowering plants will be popping up in the Culpeper, Pavilion and Lady Baillie Mediterranean Gardens, the clocks will be changing and Easter will be here!

Easter is extra early this year and we will be putting on a special Easter event from 29th March to 14th April. There will be an Easter treasure hunt, helping Lady Baillie's Great Danes, Boots and Danny, to find their lost treasure. This will include interactive installations, vibrant Easter floral displays and fiendish clues to solve, as well as encounters with live characters.

Also coming up this year are a number of major events included in your admission ticket, which is valid for twelve months. We held the Leeds Castle Weddings Showcase on 2nd/3rd March, which was well attended and has resulted in a number of new bookings. We now have a new catering partner for the daytime business, who has introduced much more choice of range and menus, as well as an excellent new coffee offer and an Ice Cream Parlour in the Stable Courtyard. We also now have five additional caterers available for weddings, dinner or corporate events, giving excellent choice of prices and menu types.

We are about to start planning conservation work for the Moat Bridge, which needs to happen below water level. This may include an inflatable dam system to hold the water back while work is completed. This is an early heads up in case you spot them on your walks and think that we are introducing an inflatable water park for the summer!

We have started to work with a number of local secondary schools, in partnership with PAYE, our Castle stonemasons, to offer workshops in heritage skills. These have been well received by the schools and offer a great opportunity for teenagers to get an understanding of what careers are available in heritage conservation and building work.



Do you remember your own PIN number?

Nearly one in five of us can't. We are so used to paying by contactless that when we have to withdraw cash or type our PIN into a card reader, our minds go blank.

'Contactless' payments hit a record high last year. A staggering 93.4 per cent of all in-store card transactions up to £100 was made using contactless, rather than cash or PIN and card reader.

According to Barclays, we now depend on contactless payments and smartphone technology so much that more than a fifth of young people now leave their wallets at home when they go shopping.

Contactless technology was first introduced by Barclaycard 17 years ago. It had a spending limit of £10. The limit was increased during the pandemic, to reduce physical contact in shops, rising to its current £100 limit.

TOWNCENTRE

Nationally and internationally shopping habits have shifted tremendously in the past 10 years, leading to town centres changing in character. Regrettably, we see many quality shops and larger chains closing. Again, this affects many towns and cities as we see long established national chains going out of business and their space being taken by charity shops, vape shops and betting shops. These problems are not new and by no means unique to Maidstone. For better or worse, we do not live in communism and, therefore, the authorities cannot prescribe what shops should and should not open in Maidstone. The council has only very limited powers, mainly under licensing laws, to restrict and control certain types of shops, like pubs and gambling places.

The current Conservative administration at MBC is working very hard not only to stop the decline of the town centre, but by devising a strategy how to make Maidstone more attractive and future proof.

Our work encompasses small things as well as more complex plans for the future. For example, you may have noticed our new planters with beautiful flowers popping up in many places along the pedestrianised zone. More elaborate greening and lighting strategies are currently being prepared for later in the year.

Our Environmental Services clean the town centre daily, and on a Sunday morning you will have trouble spotting any trash from the previous night's partying.

The MBC Environmental Protection Team, in conjunction with the police and the security officers from the BID (Business Improvement District), work hard to tackle the scourge of anti-social behaviour. For that, we now close Brenchley Gardens at night and established a manned sub-police station in that park, by converting the old toilet block.

My personal pet hate of anti-social behaviour is the illegal motor-traffic in the High Street. I lobbied long and hard for ANPR enforcement cameras to stop this dangerous behaviour in the pedestrian zone. I received assurances from the County Highways Authorities that we are considered to receive this vital enforcement tool in the not-too-distant future.

Long term, we are engaging with businesses to alleviate the decline of shopping facilities by bringing new attractions into the town centre, mainly in the entertainment and hospitality sector. Only last week we agreed at cabinet, to provide a permanent maker-space for creative businesses and artists. I can't give away too much now, but the plans are exciting and will be taken to committee **before the elections**.

Maidstone's heart must be accessible to all residents of the Borough and visitors from afar in order to be viable and to enhance the offer by increasing the footfall in the town centre. The Conservative members of MBC are,

therefore, the only party who is committed to freeze parking charges in order to support local businesses.

LITTER IN THE COUNTRYSIDE

I wholly agree that this is a problem, a very disgusting one indeed!

A sociologist may be better suited to answer why society's standards are slipping. I, however, like to point out that during February things look even worse and are perceived worse. Especially after the recent rainy and windy months, vegetation cover is reduced and the detritus is far more visible and wider spread.

However, I can absolutely state that the amount of money spent on waste collection has NOT been reduced and will not be reduced in next years budget. The Street-Scene Team is responsible within the Maidstone Borough Council and elected councillors hold them to account for carrying out this work effectively and on a regular basis. As cabinet member for Environmental Services, I hold regular talks with the lead officers, who present KPI data to me and to all councillors during committee. I also go out with the teams on occasion and personally follow up complaints, which are raised with me or my fellow councillors.

As I mentioned in previous newsletters, last summer we recruited a waste crime team with an extremely competent team leader who has many years of police background. Only a few weeks ago we allocated £40,000 to them in capital investment to purchase crime-fighting equipment, e.g. CCTV.

As soon as national government permitted local authorities to increase fines for fly-tipping and littering, I instructed my officers to implement those fines, which came into force in October last year. Littering along a trunk road will now attract a fixed penalty of £500 or an unlimited fine. The waste crime team welcomes any CCTV and photographic evidence, which can assist us in pursuing a prosecution.

Recently, you may have come across the headline "**FOI request** shows that MBC hasn't prosecuted anyone for fly tipping during the last three years". Firstly, this FOI request deals with data up to March, 2023. As I said above, our Waste Crime Team expanded immensely since last summer. And even prior, since January, 2021, MBC Waste Crime Team have investigated 103 offences of waste crime where we have been able to recover evidence. We generated £26000 in fixed penalty notice fines.

So why does this FOI request make such bad reading? Because a fixed penalty is not a prosecution. A prosecution is where a case goes to court. Under previous legislation it was not in MBC's interest to prosecute in the courts because this would have cost us money to bring the case and any fine would have gone to Central Government. Since October, 2023, legislation changed significantly and we have access to the proceeds of crime as well as any court imposed fines.

Currently we have 25 live cases under investigation for prosecution and we

are seeking forfeiture of any vehicles involved in those crimes. This includes a 32-ton tipper lorry. As I mentioned before, a large proportion of fly-tippers are commercial rogue operations. Since 1st January, 2024, we have also dealt with over 40 abandoned vehicles; that is one abandoned vehicle each working day!

Finally, Kent County Council is the Highways Authority. They must be consulted when our (MBC) crews litter-pick trunk roads. It is KCC who will have to put lane closures in place to protect our staff. These operations are, therefore, often conducted in conjunction with other works, scheduled road-closures (e.g. construction) or grass cutting, the latter is also KCC's responsibility. Unfortunately, experience shows that, within 24 hours after a thorough litter sweep, the verges are already cluttered with detritus again.

I am extremely frustrated to see our hard-working crews fighting a literally never-ending wave of litter, day after day. I hope that you will take some comfort in our commitment to take on the fight.

The current Conservative administration at MBC has no plans to cut the funding for our Street Scene Department and we assured an inflation-adjusted funding in **next year's budget**, **which was passed last week**.

LAND EAST OF LOC8 / WOODCUT FARM

You may be aware that a speculative planning application was filed a few months ago, to build another business park on the strip of land East of Loc8 / Woodcut Farm. Because we have a local plan, and this site was not in the local plan, I always considered this as a non-starter and made representations accordingly. MBC rightfully refused the application. MBC's refusal went to appeal and wiser people than me were less optimistic. I am happy to announce that the appeal inspector gave great weight to our local plan and the impact of the application site on the AONB. The inspector dismissed the appeal. We can assume that in the foreseeable future Hollingbourne will be safe from speculative planning applications.



All in the month of April

It was:

300 years ago, on **7th April**, **1724**, that the German composer **Johann Sebastian Bach**'s **'St John Passion'** was performed for the first time, at a church in Leipzig.

Also **300 years ago**, on **22nd April**, **1724**, that *Immanuel Kant*, the German philosopher was born. One of the *leading philosophers* during the **Age of Enlightenment**.

200 years ago, on **19th April**, **1824**, that **Lord Byron** died. One of the greatest **British poets** and a leading figure in the **Romantic movement**, he died of sepsis/fever while fighting for Greek independence from the Ottoman Empire, aged 36.

175 years ago, on 10th April, 1849, that American mechanic, *Walter Hunt*, was granted a US *patent* for his invention of the *safety pin*. He immediately sold the rights for \$400, which is about \$12,000 today. The company he sold it to made millions from it.

150 years ago, on **5th April**, **1874**, that **Johann Strauss II**'s operetta **'Die Fledermaus'** was performed for the first time, in Vienna.

125 years ago, on **29th April, 1899**, that **Duke Ellington**, American jazz/swing pianist, composer and orchestra leader, was born.

100 years ago, on **17th April**, **1924**, that **Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studios (MGM)** was founded when Metro Pictures, Goldwyn Pictures and Louis B Mayer Pictures merged.

Also 100 years ago, on 23rd April, 1924, that the *British Empire Exhibition* opened in Wembley, London.

90 years ago, on 3rd April, 1934, that British inventor, *Percy Shaw*, patented the *Cat's Eye* reflective road stud. He set up a company to manufacture them in 1935 and in 1937 he was awarded a government contract to mass produce them for national use.

75 years ago, on 4th April, 1949, that the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) was founded.

Also **75 years ago**, on 7th April, 1949, that the **Rodgers and Hammerstein** musical **'South Pacific'** was opened in Broadway.

70 years ago, on **7th April**, **1954**, that in a news conference about Communism in Indochina, US President, **Dwight D. Eisenhower**, explained his **'domino theory'**. He said that if one country in a region came under the influence of Communism, then the countries surrounding it would follow. He and later presidential administrations have always believed this.

Also **70** years ago, on **26th April**, **1954**, that the <u>Soviet Union</u> transferred *Crimea from Russia to Ukraine*. In 2014 Russia annexed Crimea, but it is not recognised internationally, and a number of sanctions were imposed on Russia as a result.

- **65 years ago**, on **9th April, 1959**, that *Frank Lloyd Wright*, American architect and writer, died. Regarded as 'the greatest American architect of all time.'
- **60** years ago, on **15th April**, **1964**, that twelve men convicted of carrying out the *Great Train Robbery* in England in August of 1963 were *jailed* for a total of **307** years. They were given some of the longest sentences in British criminal history.
- **50 years ago**, on **6th April, 1974**, that the Swedish pop group, **ABBA**, won the Eurovision Song Contest with their song **'Waterloo'**. It was the first time that Sweden won the contest. ABBA went on to be one of the most successful groups in music history.
- **40 years ago**, on **17th April, 1984**, that British police officer, **Yvonne Fletcher**, was shot dead during a demonstration outside the **Libyan Embassy** in London. This led to an 11-day siege by the police.
- **30 years ago**, on 6th April, 1994, that the *Rwandan genocide* began, when a plane carrying Rwandan president, *Juvenal Habyarimana*, and Burundian president, *Cyprien Ntaryamira*, was shot down by extremists. Civil war broke out the following day, and between 500,000 and one million people were massacred during the next 100 days.
- Also **30 years ago**, on **26th April, 1994**, that the *first post-apartheid multiracial elections* were held in *South Africa*, with 18 million blacks eligible to vote for the first time. Nelson Mandela was elected president and took office on 10th May.
- **25 years ago**, on **5th April**, **1999**, that **Libya** handed over to the United Nations **two suspects** in the **1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103** over Lockerbie. They were taken to the Netherlands to face trial. One was found guilty, and sentenced to life imprisonment, only to be released in 2009 because he was dying of cancer. The other suspect was acquitted.



My dear Nephew Darren,



I am not the least surprised you have got yourself into trouble; innovation is never to be encouraged. New ideas tend to cause revolutions. The move from incandescent lightbulbs to energy saving ones may ultimately change the Church of England.

Change is something everyone claims to be in favour of – provided it has no measurable effect on their own lives. I remember, as a young curate, once suggesting that, at the Harvest Supper, tables might be enlarged so that eight people could sit together rather than the traditional six, thus helping more people get to know one another. The response would have been similar if I had suggested we travel to London to murder the Prime Minister. I was firmly told that tables for six had been perfectly adequate for parishioners in Queen Victoria's day. For the rest of my curacy, I was regarded as a revolutionary, to be watched carefully.

So, at your last visit to our church, to suggest that our 11 am Mattins might be moved to 10.30am, in order to encourage those who wanted to have more of the day free to themselves, certainly lobbed a hand grenade among the post-Service coffee cups. The only person who was mildly in favour was Colonel Wainwright, who quickly realised that it would give him an extra half-hour at the gin and tonics before lunch.

Should you ever feel that people lack imagination, you should watch them in action when they find reasons for resisting an unwelcome suggestion. One said that the time couldn't be moved, since it would then be too early for the local bus – omitting to mention that none of our congregation travel to church by bus and that the service doesn't run on Sundays anyway. Another pointed out that it would confuse those who didn't attend church – not explaining why, if they never attended, it mattered what time the Service was. A third, rather touchingly mentioned that it wouldn't give the rector time to enjoy his breakfast after the rigours of the 8 am Service.

Your suggestion did, however, serve one useful purpose; it brought our congregation together in united opposition. They may not necessarily always know what they are for, but they certainly know what they are against. For that, I thank you.
